



WVU Hospitals & Clinics Good Catch Awards



December 2024 Good Catch Award

Two IVR technicians preparing an IV antibiotic product identified a critical error involving a reconstituted Zosyn 40.5-gram vial. The vial had been incorrectly reconstituted earlier in the day with 100mL of diluent, and the label indicated a final concentration of 100mg/mL. However, this was identified to be mathematically incorrect, as 100mL of diluent would result in a final concentration of 405mg/mL. Recognizing this discrepancy, these technicians promptly reported the error to their supervisor. The supervisor immediately instructed the nurse to withhold administration of the dose, preventing a potential medication error. Thank you for displaying the high reliability principle of "preoccupation with failure," where your vigilance and attention to detail caught an error prior to reaching the patient.

August 2024 Good Catch Award

Connor Digman made a critical catch during the transition of care for a patient with a history of mechanical valve replacement, who had been admitted due to gastrointestinal bleeding associated with an elevated INR greater than 10. Following the next several days without anticoagulation therapy, the INR subsequently decreased, prompting the physician team to restart enoxaparin at a dose of 130mg twice daily. Upon medication reconciliation, the pharmacist observed that the patient had previously been prescribed 100mg twice daily in preparation for an upcoming procedure. When further investigating this, he noted multiple discrepancies in the patient's documented weights during his admission. A new weight was requested from the MICU staff, which led the enoxaparin dose to be appropriately adjusted to 100mg twice daily. This pharmacist also further clarified this dose with the patient's outpatient anticoagulation clinic, ensuring accuracy.

WVU Hospitals & Clinics Antithrombotic Stewardship

The Antithrombotic Stewardship Program (ATS), entering its 4th year, is dedicated to enhancing the safety and quality of antithrombotic use across the continuum of care at WVU hospitals. This team is multidisciplinary comprised of two clinical specialist pharmacists, one clinical pharmacy technician, two quality nurse specialists, and is overseen by a physician medical director. The team works collaboratively with patients, clinical pharmacists, and medical staff to positively impact the safe and effective utilization of antithrombotic medications and achieve optimal patient outcomes while minimizing harm.

Pharmacist-to-dose Protocol Impact on Patient Encounters with an INR ≥ 5	2024
All services mean patient encounters with INR \ge 5	9.9%
No Pharmacist-to-Dose Protocol	16.3%
Pharmacist to Dose Protocol	6.6%

- The ATS Clinical Pharmacy technician documented a total of 744 patients reviewed on newly started oral anticoagulants
 - Each patient was assessed for cost and affordability, prescription transcription, and if the medication was picked up after discharge
 - 166 patients were provided a warfarin education booklet at the bedside
- Over 250 ATS Clinical Pharmacist interventions were documented for the optimization of therapy with anticoagulation including: DOACs, warfarin, VTE prophylaxis, anticoagulation reversal, and lab monitoring
 - Patients were identified by the team's Epic Alert Scoring Tool, for which the pharmacists reviewed greater than 7800 alerts for the year
 - Additionally, ATS pharmacists were able to provide transitions of care (TOC) assistance for 132 patients identified during their clinical review
- Since the inception of the Pharmacist to Dose Warfarin (PTD) protocol in January 2023, the ATS pharmacists continue monitor PTD service performance and provide support as necessary
 - Percent pharmacist managed warfarin regimens by visit: 68.6%
 - Overall rate of INR ≥5 hospital-wide: 9.9%
 - Rate of INR ≥5 when managed by pharmacists: 6.6%
 - Rate of INR \geq 5 when not managed by pharmacists: 16.3%
- ATS Clinical Pharmacists critically reviewed 97 Mountain ZERO hospital acquired VTE cases for error and future interventions
- With the goal of providing education within 24-48 hours of discharge, ATS nurses called 1605 (90%) of eligible patients to provide high-risk medication education and follow up
- ATS nurses frequently identify and triage issues as they assess patients for their understanding of the use of their anticoagulation, as well as if they anticipate any barriers to compliance with the medication

This team oversees the procurement, storage, preparation, distribution, and delivery of medications throughout WVU Hospitals. Our time and service are dedicated to operating the central pharmacy, including the IV room, controlled substance vault, and perioperative services. The pharmacy operations team is comprised of highly experienced and dedicated technicians, interns, pharmacists, and leaders to meet the needs of patients at WVU Hospitals.

Central Operations

- Transitioned from a once daily to twice daily Omnicell restock for all nursing areas, resulting in >40% reduction in medication stockouts
- Improved patient specific dose dispensing through the addition of a second daily unit dose cartfill, resulting in >10% reduction in centrally dispensed first doses
- Implemented Compounding and Repackaging (CNR) operational workflows for centrally dispensed half tablets and short stability medications, adding a barcode on the tablet packaging for nursing barcode medication administration

Sterile Products and Perioperative Services

- Implemented Omnicell's Anesthesia Closed Loop (ACL) to streamline anesthesia documentation and pharmacy controlled substance reconciliation workflows
- Implemented Omnicell Central Pharmacy Manager (CPM) technology for automated inventory management in the hazardous sterile compounding area and perioperative services satellite
- Improved patient specific dose preparation through addition of a fourth cartfill and optimizing insulin glargine preparation practices

Clinical pharmacy specialists and generalists at WVUH provide patient care to adult populations in both acute care and ambulatory care settings. Clinical pharmacist services are tailored to patient care needs, and may include development of individualized the pharmacotherapy medication plans, management and optimization, patient education, and coordinating transitions of care. In addition to direct patient care, the clinical pharmacists lead quality improvement initiatives, precept learners, and serve on department and hospital committees and workgroups to advance the practice of pharmacy and raise the quality of patient care at WVUH.

The Acute Care Adult Clinical Services pharmacy division comprises all adult inpatient medical and surgical service areas and their related specialty areas. It is composed of

clinical generalist pharmacists and clinical specialist pharmacists providing around-the-clock pharmacy services for 75 adult services. Clinical pharmacists are integrated into patient care teams as part of a practice model consisting of service line-based coverage, with clinical pharmacists predominantly decentralized. Clinical pharmacists participate in daily interdisciplinary patient care rounds for most medical services in addition to order verification duties, management of pharmacist-owned protocols, emergency response, and other patient care activities.

Alcohol Use Disorder Treatment

Patients with Alcohol Use Disorder (AUD) typically present with a varying severity of symptoms that requires careful triaging and subsequent management. The adult clinical pharmacy group partnered with provider and nursing colleagues to initiate a novel screening tool, the prediction of alcohol withdrawal severity scale (PAWSS), for these patients in the emergency department. This scoring tool can help predict the severity of a patient's withdrawal symptoms and proactively inform what level of care is most appropriate for a patient. In addition to this scoring tool, additional treatment pathways were developed to allow for clinical flexibility when choosing a pharmacotherapy-based regimen to treat a patient during the course of their withdrawals.



The WVU Medicine Pharmacy Residency Program was started in 1985 by the Residency Coordinator, Art Poremba, and accredited by ASHP in 1987. Since the program's inception, nearly 40 classes have completed the program, consisting of over 200 resident alumni. The programs continues to gain national exposure, having had residents from school across the country and an alumni base that ventures out to service patients across the United States.



WVU Medicine Children's celebrated 2 years of operations in September 2024. The pharmacy team has settled into their new home and are working to optimize operations and clinical services.



WVU Hospitals & Clinics Children's Hospital

Key highlights from the Children's Hospital pharmacy team in 2024:

- The operations team fully implemented EPIC's compounding and repacking module to ensure all compounding records for sterile and non-sterile preparations are recorded electronically accounting for 11,319 preparations.
- Utilized EPIC's dose automation via orderable ERXs which incorporate items such as age, weight, and concentration to allow for a rule based dispense map. Andrew Allison, PharmD, BCPPS submitted EPIC mapping tickets for over 40 medications including IV and oral products which are now live. Huge win for patient safety!
- The December 2024 issue of NEJM highlighted exciting finding in a trial for pediatric acute lymphoblastic leukemia which added blinatumomab to traditional chemotherapy. It demonstrated a 3-year disease free survival of > 98% and < 5% risk of relapse. This led to blinatumomab + chemotherapy now being the standard of care. With these ground-breaking results, the WVU Medicine Children's team successfully transitioned 28-day acute care blinaumomab therapy to the home setting via InfuSystem® CADD- Solis pumps for 7 patients by the end of 2024.
- The first dose of a new gene therapy, Elevidys (delandistrogene-moxeparvovecrokl), was administered in West Virginia at Children's. Gretchen Horning, PharmD, BCPPS was recognized by the Bravo team for her contributions in ensuring the patient received approval and treatment.
- Ashley Parker, PharmD began rounding two days per week with the Obstetrics and Maternal Fetal Medicine services and precepted our first PGY2 resident OB rotation.
- Ashley Martin, PharmD worked with the national BPD (bronchopulmonary dysplasia) collaborative, Vermont Oxford Network, and the Children's hospital Small Baby Committee to provide the best care to our smallest patients.



- Implemented virtual inventory management using Omnicell CPM hardware and software (achieved over \$300,000 annualized inventory cost optimizations in 2024)
- Obtained space for and rolled out a net new Investigational Product storage space for ambulatory clinical trial treatments
- Caught and intervened on errors within over 80 unique ambulatory ("take-home") oncolytic prescription through prospective verification queue for all discharge and clinic prescribed oncolytics
- Migrated all IDS clinical and operational files to a new Microsoft Teams based location to streamline interdisciplinary collaboration
- Implemented workflows to begin supporting the new RNI Infusion Center with unit dose and compounded medication clinical order verification and delivery (golive January 2025)
- Launched the MBRCC Pharmacy/Nursing "Walking in My Shoes" shadowing immersion initiative to improve workflows and communication between MBRCC Infusion Nursing and WVUH CC Pharmacy staff
- Updated IDS SOPs and Policies to optimize to further streamline workflows and charge capture for pharmacy clinical trials support in 2025
- Implemented a WVUH protocol to allow pharmacists to discontinue BEACON treatment/therapy/supportive plans without activity within a year since provider order entry (discontinued over 920 plans associated with past and current WVUH oncology providers)

 - Developed a mammalian bite guideline for enterprise use.
- Jenni Shahan led a pharmacist escape room as a treat during pharmacy week.
- Culture of Safety Survey completed with 100% pharmacy participation.



In 2024, the Ambulatory Care Division continued to expand and innovate in providing comprehensive care to our patients. This year, we proudly welcomed a clinical pharmacist specializing in medical weight management, further expanding our service offerings. Additionally, we secured financial approval for both a rheumatology clinic pharmacist and a PGY1 pharmacy resident with a focus on ambulatory care, marking significant steps in enhancing our team and capabilities.

Over the past five years, the division has experienced remarkable growth, with the addition of six new pharmacist positions. As part of our ongoing commitment to improving care delivery, we began professionally billing in internal medicine clinics and now maintain seven collaborative practice agreements—an initiative we plan to expand even further in 2025.



Our commitment to advancing research and patient care has led to the initiation of a grant-funded research project in partnership with WVUHS Specialty Pharmacy and the GI clinic. In addition, we launched and led FARMacy WV, a prescription produce program designed to provide high-quality fruits and vegetables to patients free of charge, along with education on creating healthy recipes. To further support our providers, we have strengthened our medication review education and resources for both nursing staff and physicians, ensuring a holistic and efficient approach to patient care.

WVU Hospitals & Clinics Medication History & Reconciliation Program

The Adult Medication History and Reconciliation Program experienced significant growth and success in 2024, achieving record volumes without additional staffing. A major milestone was the November 2024 implementation of Dr. First within Epic, enhancing the accuracy and reliability of outpatient pharmacy dispensing information to support the team's ultimate goal of a 100% capture rate.



Key accomplishments in 2024:

- Introduced a new Tableau dashboard for accurate and consistent progress tracking.
- Streamlined follow-up processes among technicians to improve efficiency.
- Developed pharmacist support documents to standardize workflows.

The Infectious Diseases Pharmacy services team consists of one lead clinical pharmacy specialist, five clinical pharmacy specialists and one administrative assistant.

Antimicrobial Stewardship

- Developed a website and web-based application, MedCompass, in conjunction with our Information Technology colleagues that houses 40+ WVU Medicine health-system approved clinical guidance documents to ensure our clinicians have the information they need in the palm of their hand, literally.

- In collaboration with Kelly Smith, Pharmacy Manager at Fairmont Medical Center, the Fairmont Medical Center Skilled Nursing Unit achieved Platinum status for the WV Office of Epidemiology and Prevention Services Maximizing Efforts Dedicated to Antimicrobial Leadership and Stewardship (MEDALS) Program
 - The purpose of the MEDALS Program is to recognize facilities that have elements in place to support an antimicrobial stewardship program and are working to improve antibiotic use and infection prevention practices.
 - The FMT SNU is the second facility within West Virginia to achieve the Platinum level for MEDALS.
- Hosted second annual WVU Medicine Foundations of Antimicrobial Stewardship Seminar Day with participants from across the health-system in 2024.
- WVUH antimicrobial use trends remain favorable in 2024. The top three antimicrobials in 2024 being cefazolin, vancomycin, and cefepime.
- Maintained total WVUH anti-infective spend per patient day in 2024 with a monthly average of \$12.41/patient day which is a 2% reduction from 2023 with a \$12.71 anti-infective spend per patient day.

Outpatient Parenteral Antimicrobial Therapy (OPAT)

- 1,156 OPAT consults were completed in 2024.
- Our OPAT program also continued to expand upon continuous infusion vancomycin for patients receiving home infusion. A medication use evaluation was conducted that demonstrated a low rate of AKI in this patient population, < 10%, which is a touted benefit of continuous infusion vancomycin in the literature.

Complex Outpatient Antimicrobial Therapy (COpAT)

• Our COpAT services continued to grow with 543 consults ordered in 2024.

The Team

The 340B Program Management Team was established in March 2020. Since then, it has made significant progress in compliance, financial performance, expansion of number of covered entities and contract pharmacies, manage program complexity, and increased staffing.

The Enterprise 340B Management Team is responsible for overseeing and ensuring effective implementation, compliance, and optimization for WVU Medicine. The 340B Pricing Program is a U.S. federal program that requires drug manufacturers to provide discounted prices on outpatient drugs to eligible healthcare organizations, which care for a high proportion of low-income patients. The program is designed to help these organizations stretch their limited resources, enabling them provide to more comprehensive care to vulnerable and underserved populations.

Director, Enterprise Medication Use The focus of the WVU Medicine Health System Medication Use Team is to collaborate with healthcare professionals and provide expertise to promote the safe, effective and fiscally responsible use of medications for our patients. This is achieved through integration with clinical and operational staff, as well as those in medication safety, informatics, and pharmacy leadership. Medication Use is directly responsible for assessing the clinical and safety impact of medications, forecasting future drug therapies, performing and assisting clinicians in the execution of medication use evaluations and other benchmarking strategies.

The Medication Use Team is also responsible for the coordination of the WVU Medicine Health System Pharmacy and Therapeutics (eP&T) Committee, in addition to the nine subcommittees focusing on ambulatory care, hematology/oncology, critical care, perioperative services, antithrombotic stewardship, antimicrobial stewardship, hospital medicine, medication safety and infusion technology.

Specific Initiatives the Medication Use Team also focused on included:

- Coordinated over 25 Medication Use Evaluations across multiple residency programs and the WVU School of Pharmacy with outcomes data presented at Vizient Pharmacy Network Meeting/ASHP Midyear Meeting.
- Promoted the safe and effective care of patients with myasthenia gravis, immune thrombocytopenia and multiple sclerosis through provider education and the development of clinical guidance and medication order panels.
- Integrated nine WVU Medicine hospitals into the systemwide Smart Pump Drug Library and supported smart pump implementation efforts.
- Developed strategies to aid providers in the safe and effective use of medications with a Risk Evaluation and Mitigation Strategies (REMS) program.
- Delivered five educational presentations to WVU Medicine physician stakeholders and five clinical pharmacy workshops to continue educational efforts and communicate opportunities of medication use optimization.
- Developed and deployed two nursing-focused clinical program collaboratives across the health system focused on anti-thrombotic and anti-infective medications.
- Partnered with each of the six WVUHS Institutes for one medication related initiative.
- Developed a comprehensive, online formulary management tool with integrated resources for safe prescribing of medications.
- Published six issues of the Med Use Newsletter that contains pertinent news updates and articles on current pharmacy topics, as well as systemwide updates to the formulary and electronic health record (EHR).
- Managed dedicated project time for pharmacists to develop strategies to integrate medication therapies into clinical care pathways to improve patient outcomes in several disease states, notably:
